OVERVIEW OF ASD

- 1 in 54 children are diagnosed with autism.
- Autism significantly impacts social skills, communication, and behavior across the lifetime.

- Create a welcoming work environment that provides all employees with the tools and skills necessary to be successful.



WHY HIRE INDIVIDUALS WITH AUTISM

- Employees can be loyal, creative, and may contribute greatly to the workplace.
- By hiring individuals with autism, businesses receive tax benefits, access to new markets, and increase retention rates among employees.



RECRUITING PRACTICES

- Create job posts that include only the essential functions of the job and the specific skill the employee needs to complete the job.
- Collaborate with local community partners, including the Els for Autism Foundation.

INTERVIEWING BEST **PRACTICES**

- Implement structured interviews and provide applicants with alternative ways to demonstrate skills.
- Provide accommodations so the applicant has the opportunity to best demonstrate distinct strengths and abilities.

- Comprehensive and well-planned onboarding is a key factor to ensuring a successful transition for the newly hired team member.
- **Employees with autism benefit from** utilizing visual supports, detailed instructions, and specific feedback.
